Last weekend was a time for making history! The Upper Midwest Conference of the Global Methodist Church held its first conference (which was also its convening conference), where we voted in agreement to be established as a conference of the Global Methodist Church.

Another first last weekend was ordaining one deacon and 45 elders into the church. I have never been to any conference that ordained so many at one time!

I spent 25 years in the United Methodist Church and never experienced a conference like this one. My thoughts and the thoughts of many others were that this is what conference is supposed to be like. As one leader put it, "My people were amazed that it was Spirit-filled. Leaving behind the past and striving to move forward for God's glory is what the conference was all about, and it stunned them. They are looking forward to next year and meeting more people from all the regions! God is good."

The Spirit truly was present in this gathering—through our worship, through building relationships, through ordination, and through our new leadership. Bishop Mark Webb was present to bring a message of encouragement and lead the ordination service. We also heard messages from our President Pro Tem James Parks and Vice President Pro Tem Ross Reinhiller. We look to them to lead us into the future as a church of Jesus Christ that worships passionately, loves extravagantly, and witnesses boldly!

This edition of our conference newsletter will be mostly focused on our convening conference. We hope you were blessed by this gathering and encouraged to move forward as the church of Jesus Christ to worship, love, and witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ.

The Upper Midwest Provisional Conference became officially a Global Methodist Conference on November 1. The very next day, we held our Convening Conference in Watertown, South

Dakota. The theme of the conference was "New Beginnings."

It was a blessed time of worship, prayer, mission spotlights and breakout sessions. Two highlights for me were the business session and the ordination service. I know it might be weird to think the business session was a highlight, but it was. The reason it was a highlight is that it took less than an hour of our time (Actual business probably was 20 minutes). It was one motion, and it was passed unanimously. The ordination service was also a highlight, with 46 ordinands! Many of the ordained have been serving in ministry for years as licensed local pastors. From this Convening Conference, my hope and prayer is that we continue to move forward together. It is up to each of us to be about the work of Jesus Christ. Notes From The Upper Midwest Convening Conference

What an exciting time! At the beginning of this month, the Upper Midwest Provisional Conference was held at Cornerstone Church in Watertown South Dakota. <u>New</u> <u>Beginnings</u> was the theme of the gathering and we came together from seven different states in the upper Midwest: Iowa, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Wyoming.

Thursday evening after the checkin time, all were welcomed and we heard from our President Pro Tempore, Rev. James Parks from Davenport, Iowa. He spoke on new beginnings from John chapter 1 about starting from the Word of God and recognizing the Holy Spirit that has been with us from the beginning, even the beginning of time as we know it (alluding to Genesis chapter 1).

Rev. Valerie Reinhiller from Williston, ND, who had led the Transitional Team, reminded us about the encounter Jesus had with the woman in the crowd who touched his robe (Matthew 9:21). She had been "subject to bleeding for 12 years". After all the years, spending all she had on various physicians and not getting better; not able to be with family, not having any friends, ostracized from society, this was definitely a new beginning for her! She was cleansed not only physically and allowed to go back to friends and family but cleansed spiritually as well according to Jewish Law and according to her new found faith in Jesus.

Bishop Webb brought a message referencing Acts chapters 3-4. This Scripture is recorded referencing the time of the early church; during its formation. Jewish converts to Christianity were still allowed to worship in the Temple and "One day Peter and John were going up to the temple" when they encounter a crippled beggar whom they healed. A crowd gathered and Peter spoke to them which eventually led to Peter and John being taken to the Sanhedrin where Peter again gave witness. "They (Sanhedrin) were astonished and they took note that these men had been with Jesus" (Acts 4:13). We need to be "with Jesus".

Rev. Ross Reinhiller, our Vice President Pro-Tempore from Williston, ND started us off with Friday morning worship picking up from the book of Acts again. In chapter 3, at the Gate Beautiful approaching the Temple, a beggar was there perhaps for years or perhaps all his life. Peter and John approach the crippled beggar and Peter told him to turn and look straight at them. The beggar expected to get something from them. "Then Peter said, 'Silver or gold I do not have, but what I have I give you. In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, walk." And of course, he not only walked but got up and danced around. Peter and John were asked by the Sanhedrin "By what power or what name did you do this?" (Acts 4:7). What an opportunity! Those in the world are initially willing to take so little for change and we can provide answers to a questioning world.

The first order of business for the business portion of the conference, led by our President Pro Tempore, was to elect the secretary for the conference. Dale Fadley, South Dakota, was elected by unanimous vote. Rev. Parks then went on to remind us how the intention for the conference was to keep expenses to a minimum as there were no individual registration fees to attend. Another area he touched on was the realization of communication amongst all the churches and how he hopes to be addressing this very soon.

Next, our Vice President Pro-Tempore, took us through the "Upper Midwest Convening Annual Conference Journal". This document was unanimously approved with little discussion.

Bishop Webb then made reference to the GMC and revival that seems to be going on in various places across the globe and our prayer is to "do it again, and again, and again!" He made the points that Scripture should guide every part of our lives and we should watch-over one another in love. As a church, we need to experience more following and more leading.

Visualizing the future, we view the GMC as a global movement, planting new churches and helping to equip churches by sharing our resources. We need to partner with other local churches; making disciples and holding each other accountable to the mission. We are building a new GMC global culture. In closing, Bishop Webb encouraged us to be in continual prayer for the new President By: John Carpenter

Pro Tempore, the vice-president, the presiding elders and all those in positions of leadership and serving on boards and committees.

Jeff Pospisil had been the treasurer for the conference but has now moved to serve as treasurer for the denomination. Bishop Webb encouraged us to lift-up the 45 pastors and 1 deacon being ordained stating there will inevitably be more ordinations to come. It is the local church now that will be especially encouraging local pastors who are expected to do good and to do no harm.

Roger Sparr spoke about the People of "New Beginnings". He brought to mind the Scripture in Philippians 3:13-14 — to remember, to forget, to press on for the prize and not be distracted for what God would have us do. God is real and we are in a new movement, seeing God's power in our lives manifest in a new way. We press-on for the heavenly prize when we shall all stand before God. We experience God's power being used in our lives impacting lives forever. We can see our lives as ripples going out from the center in a pond. What then does this say for the church in which we are to be the salt and the light of the world?

Friday afternoon there was a panel discussion (questions and answers) followed by various break-out sessions. Friday evening was a time for mission spotlights led by Rev. Joleen Pietrazk. There were several mission organizations represented.

Saturday morning was taken up with Ordination. Bishop Webb spoke to the ordinands as the rest of us listened-in. He brought up three main points. (1) Trust the One who calls you. (2) Trust the sufficiency of the one who calls you. (3) Trust the promise of completion. The rest of the service was the ordination liturgy.

The Upper Midwest Provisional Conference consists of 170 churches. We thank the Lord for all the blessings, and we are grateful to all who made our acceptance as a Provisional Conference possible. All Conferences in the Global Methodist Church are provisional until the convening General Conference which will be held September 20-26, 2024, in San Jose, Costa Rica.


