Meet Bishop Mark Webb

Bishop Mark Webb spoke twice at the New Hope Conference held on April 21-22 in Fargo, ND.

Webb, who is from Lancaster, PA, spoke on the necessity for people to be intensional in following Christ, becoming a true disciple and encouraging other to do the same.

Mark J. Webb currently serves as a bishop in The Global Methodist Church.

He was elected a bishop in The United Methodist Church and consecrated on July 20, 2012, at the Northeast Jurisdictional Conference. Mark served as the episcopal leader of the Upper New York Area of the United Methodist Church from September 1, 2012, until December 31, 2022. On January 2, 2023, he was received as an elder and bishop in The Global Methodist Church.

Mark holds a M. Div. from Asbury Theological Seminary and a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology from Shippensburg University. He also holds a graduate certificate in nonprofit management from the University of Connecticut.

He served pastorates at Aldersgate United Methodist Church, Mechanicsburg, Pa. from 1994-2007, St. Paul's United Methodist Church, Wormleysburg, Pa. from 1991-1994, and Linglestown United



Methodist Church from 1989-1991. He served as District Superintendent of the York District of the Susquehanna Conference of the United Methodist Church from 2007-2012.

Mark currently serves as a Trustee of United Theological Seminary in Dayton, Ohio

He received the Harry Denman Evangelism Award in 2002 and in 2018, was named as one of the top 100 leaders by the John C. Maxwell Transformational Leadership Award.

Mark encourages clergy and laity to work together in the development of discipleship pathways that will point people to Jesus Christ and bear fruit for the kingdom of God. He has a passion for Christ-following leadership development, new faith communities and ensuring existing congregations grow in vitality and fulfill the mission of "making disciples of Jesus Christ who worship passionately, love extravagantly and witness boldly".

He is a native of Williamsport, PA and is married to Jodi. Mark and Jodi live in Lititz, PA and have two sons, Tyler, who is married to Lyndsay and Benjamin, who is married to Mary.

God is Moving in Mesa AZ

Imagine what it would be like to be a winter visitor to the Phoenix AZ area and not have a place to go for a traditional Wesleyan worship experience in a Global Methodist Church. One of our own Dakotas Global Methodist pastors is planting a church in Mesa AZ so there will be one there when you arrive next year.

The Phoenix metropolitan area, also known as the Valley of the Sun, is home to 4.85 million people as of 2020, making it the 11th largest by population in the United States. The area has grown 22.4% since 2020. It is a mission field ripe for harvesting.

Of all the United Methodist churches in the area, not a single church will disaffiliate. The Desert Southwest United Methodist Conference and the Western Jurisdiction made disaffiliation financially impossible, even if a church wanted to. Therefore, the only opportunity there is to extend the traditional hand is to begin new places of ministry across the "Wild West".

Why Should A Church Leave The UMC?

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Due to divergence regarding the traditional doctrinal positions of the Bible and the United Methodist (UMC) denomination versus the liberal/progressive element in the UMC, especially the Minnesota Conference, Lake City United Methodist Church (now Redeeming Grace Community Church) used this process of determining if, when and how to separate from the UMC.

The UMC's governing document is the Book of Discipline and confirms the Biblical basis of our beliefs as a church. Primary areas of divergence are:

Authority of Scripture

Traditional Position.

The Bible is self-proving of its authority as the Word of God. We believe the authority of the Bible is supreme—above everything, because it is from our creator God. Liberal UMC view.

Scripture is a dynamic document that should be modified due to cultural changes, even if conflicts with Scriptural truths. The Bible is a man-made document and not divinely inspired.

Divinity of Christ and the Doctrine of Salvation

Traditional Position.

Jesus is the Son of God, part of the Trinity, who became a man and died as atonement for our sins. Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to mankind by which we must be saved.

Liberal UMC view.

Many believe Christ is not Divine. The story of Christ life, death and resurrection is a myth. There are many ways to God apart from Jesus.

Sin and Holiness

Traditional Position.

Is there a difference between Sin and Holiness; Good and Evil; Right or Wrong. We believe that God is the arbiter of what is Sin and Holiness; Good and Evil; Right or Wrong; it is not up to us; God told us what is good and evil.

<u>Liberal UMC view.</u>

The world would say it is all relative. You have your truth and I have my truth. No truth is more important that anyone else's truth. If you believe it with all your heart it is true – for you.

Ethics Considerations

Many Annual Conferences in the UMC including the Minnesota Annual Conference have been in open rebellion against the General Conference's will found in the Book of Discipline.

For Such a Time as This?

At the recent New Hope Conference held at Calvary Fargo Church, attendees heard Phil Schmidt preach from the book of Esther. Phil is the pastor of Redeeming Grace Community Church in Lake City, Minnesota. Reflecting on Esther 4:14 (And who knows but that you have come to your royal position for such a time as this?), he made the point that, for Esther, this was a time to possibly save the lives of a whole lot of people at the risk of her own life. Is this any different for church leaders in our time?

United Methodist churches have been dying at an alarming rate for decades. The chart shows the decline in the number of United Methodist churches in the Dakotas from 345 to 225 congregations. At the same time, the number of people who describe themselves as United Methodist went from 6.1% of the population to 2.7% of the population. Minnesota, lowa, Nebraska, and Missouri likely have similar trends.




Figure 1: Number of United Methodist churches in Dakotas

Is this slow death of Methodist churches inevitable, or is there the possibility to save the lives of a whole lot of churches? For many churches that have disaffiliated and joined the Global Methodist denomination, they are experiencing a time of blessing and new life (new believers, increased attendance and offerings, and a spirit of unity). For many of these churches, they disaffiliated because one person stepped forward risking much. Many have risked careers, reputations, relationships, finances, and so much more to possibly save the life of their church. They have taken up their cross and followed Jesus (Matthew 16:24).

My belief is that the LORD is using this season of disaffiliation to remind Methodists of the courage and sacrifice that is needed to follow Christ and to train us for greater service in His Kingdom. I am thankful for and continue to pray for those that are risking much. -Jeff Pospisil

Dakotas Annual Conference of the UMC, June 2023

We are asking <u>all retirees</u>, lay and clergy representatives who have a vote at the next Annual Conference to please make arrangements to <u>**BE THERE**</u> this year to represent the traditional vote. There are **important pieces of legislation** being voted on – disaffiliations, resolutions and general items of importance – that need your voice and vote. Several of the churches, clergy, and retirees left the denomination following the last conference and will not be present this year. Therefore, **your participation is crucial**.

Two resolutions will involve (1) the clarification of health benefits to retirees and continuation of the HRA to qualified retired clergy after retirement regardless of affiliation and (2) a special annual conference in September to allow all the churches who desire disaffiliation to do so before the end of the year. And, of course, those churches who are being voted for disaffiliation will need your support.

If these items pass, for some of you, this will be the last Annual Conference you will most likely attend in person with your colleagues. We want to continue our holy conferencing at our GMC Convening Annual Conference to come soon.
