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How Is It With Your Rest?

I had a unique "vacation" recently.


I married into a wonderful family from Tennessee, and each year they gather for an old Methodist tradition: **camp meeting**. My wife's family traces their roots back to an ancestor who was converted by Francis Asbury and began hosting camp meetings in 1826 just outside Brownsville, Tennessee. (Next year will mark the 200th anniversary!)

Camp meeting is a week filled with family milestones and deep spiritual rhythms. We baptize new babies, celebrate recent weddings, and remember those who have joined the church triumphant. We worship twice a day, and it's often a time of renewal for me.

This year was different.

Instead of simply receiving, I was invited to pour out. I served as the preacher for the week—twice a day, every day. I believe it was the first time a family member (even an "in-law" like me!) had been asked to fill that role. It was an incredible blessing... and also deeply exhausting. For this introvert, it was not quite the restful week I'd anticipated.

This experience reminded me of something I heard often during my preparation for ministry: pastors aren't always great at resting. I've



That's why we have to be intentional about building in rest—both vacation time and a regular sabbath rhythm. While vacations are valuable, the most meaningful practice for me is my weekly Sabbath. Every Friday, I set aside time to be in God's presence. I try to stay off email and slow down on checking my phone. Instead, I read, listen to a podcast, nap, shoot some hoops, or go for a bike ride. When I'm faithful to this rhythm, I notice I'm more grounded and need fewer extended getaways to feel refreshed.

I want to encourage every pastor and church in our conference to develop a shared plan for pastoral rest. Talk about it. Write it down. Clarify vacation days and Sabbath expectations. Communicate the plan with the congregation and support one another in honoring it.

Currently, the *Book of Doctrines and Discipline* of the Global Methodist Church doesn't offer specific guidance on this topic, so it's up to each local church to decide. It might be helpful for our conference to offer a recommendation or model policy. If you have ideas or input, I'd love to hear them. Email me your suggestions, and the Cabinet and Leadership Council can begin working toward a shared recommendation.

In the meantime, here's a sample policy from another conference that could serve as a conversation starter. It's not official for us—just a helpful starting point:

Sample Recommendation:

While vacation policies should be set by the local congregation and negotiated between the clergy and the PPR, the Annual Conference values rest and refreshment for all clergy. Recommended Minimum:

- 4 weeks of vacation, including 4 Sundays
- 1 week annually for Sabbatical/Continuing Education
- 1-3 months of Sabbatical every 4 years

Let's care well for one another by encouraging rhythms of rest. Pastors, we have the opportunity to model Sabbath living and remind our congregations that God's design—to rest one day in seven—is not a burden but a gift.

Exodus 20:11

"For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but he rested on the seventh day. Therefore the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy." Let's be intentional about rest—because a rested leader is a more faithful, fruitful one.



Worship, Fasting, and Discerning Prayer: Fueling a Multiplication Culture

As we continue pursuing the vision of becoming a Conference where Every Church Plants, it's tempting to focus first on strategies, systems, and structure. And while these are important, we must remember: evangelism, discipleship, and multiplication begin with *spiritual alignment*, not organizational efficiency. In Acts 13, the early church at Antioch was not in a strategic planning session or developing a marketing campaign when Holy Spirit said to set aside and send out Barnabas and Saul. And I think clarity is important here: Holy Spirit said to set apart and send and the church heard and obeyed.

Are we as clergy, local leadership, and congregations in a practiced posture of submission so that when the Lord speaks, we are able to hear and obey? Are we intentionally spending time listening for God's will in worship, fasting, and prayer?

While they were worshiping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said, "Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them." So after they had fasted and prayed, they placed their hands on them and sent them off. Acts 13:2-3

This is a clear reminder: Our mission does not begin with us; it begins with God.

The command (because it is a direct command: Mt 28:18-20) to multiply disciples, which results in birthing new congregations, comes from the Holy Spirit, not spreadsheets.

Is structure and developing proper processes needed? Absolutely. But they must be the result of our connection to God, not a replacement for Him.

Fasting and prayer position us to hear clearly - personally and as a congregation. They silence the noise of our preferences, our busyness, and even our fear. Through spiritual disciplines, we learn to trust God with every part of the process and follow His lead. (*To hear more check out Ep.07 of the Multiplication Minute with Cam Scott who is planting 1927 Church in Des Moines, IA: youtube.com/@UpperMidwestMultiplicationTeam*) One of the overlooked truths in Acts 13 is that the discernment didn't come to Paul and Barnabas alone, but it came in the context of prayer, fasting, and worship within a local church. Multiplying churches are praying churches, and multiplying leaders are discerning leaders.

You might be asking, What Does This Look Like for My Congregation?

1. Establish a Spiritual Development calendar.

An intentional rhythm of corporate discerning prayer, worship, and fasting results in a culture that listens for and obeys the will of the Lord. It also results in identifying and developing leaders who grow in spiritual maturity. Congregation \rightarrow Leaders \rightarrow Core Spiritual Leaders

- 2. Form a Discernment Group.
- As the rhythm of spiritual disciplines is established, curate a group of spiritual leaders who regularly seek God's direction in the mission of your local church.

- 3. Surrender, Ask, Listen, Obey
- <u>Surrender</u>. As you draw closer to the Lord, learn to surrender your preferences to Him and to one another: confess your preferences when discerning direction on decisions and learn to truly trust.
- <u>Ask</u>. Inquire of the Lord "Who are we not seeing in our community?" "Where are you sending us?" "What needs to be released in us so we can better hear and obey?" "Lord, what question should we actually be asking?"
- <u>Listen</u>. If we ask a question we must listen for the answer. Learn to be in silence as a group and listen. After a time of silence, ask if someone heard a word from the Lord. Did a verse come to mind, or a particular instance from our history as a church, or did a deeper question surface, etc.?
- <u>Obey</u>. The reason we surrender first is so that we can better obey. Too often we inquire of the Lord without first surrendering and when we sense a direction we then negotiate. We learn the voice of our Great Shepherd (Jn 10:27) so we can know Him and follow His commands (1 Jn 2:3). A choice of partial obedience is disobedience.

Start small. Start now. Stay consistent. Dream big.

This is a step your leadership and congregation must take. Don't wait.

And if you sense your congregation is ready to step deeper into this, begin praying about implementing a church-wide Spiritual Development Calendar in January 2026.

Nobody's Perfect

Every time someone joins the church where I serve, I always try to explain a bit about what makes Methodism distinct. Sometimes, people grew up in a Methodist Church but, as often, they had an experience in a different tradition or else no church background at all and I want them to know what this is all about. I always share, like in my first article for this newsletter, that Methodism, at its core, just wants to be about making faithful Christians. However, I also talk about places where Methodists put a lot of weight where other traditions don't.

One of those things is a doctrine that Wesley taught which he called "Christian Perfection." In my experience, people don't like that name at *all*. People often have an instinctive rejection of anything with the word "perfect" in it. One of the ways that we in the GMC have tried to avoid that reaction is by using the phrase "entire sanctification" as a synonym. In fact, you find "entire sanctification" more often in our *Book of Doctrines and Discipline* than "Christian perfection," although all our historic questions for ordinands use the language of perfection.

I understand the desire to avoid using a term with such baggage, but I wonder if we miss the beauty that Wesley was getting at.

Let's step back from the language for a moment and ask some practical questions. Which do you believe is the more powerful force? Sin or grace? Put that way, it is hard for a Christian to say anything but grace. How about this question? In which part of your life do you think that sin is more powerful than God's grace? In which part of your life do you think God either doesn't want you to be redeemed or else is not able to redeem you?

In the end, all Christian Perfection is really saying is that grace is stronger than sin, that God wants to save *all* of ourselves, even where we are most broken. It is a conviction that redemption starts in *this* life and continues to grow and that we never get to the point in our lives where we can say that God is done working in us and we just are stuck in our sin.

Now, that being said, I wonder if sometimes we want to resist a doctrine of Christian Perfection because we secretly don't *want* every aspect of our lives to be redeemed. Perhaps we have areas of our lives where we kind of *like* to keep God out of it. Maybe we even have sins in our lives that we quietly nourish and enjoy and we don't like the idea of having to turn that part of our lives over to God. If that is the case, then our problem isn't with Christian Perfection, it is with God, because God has made it clear that he wants us to turn our whole hearts to Him.

Whether you call it Christian Perfection, Entire Sanctification, or even just the goal of being a Christian in general, this is a precious treasure of our theological heritage. Let us keep it and preserve it, even when it is hard.


