The Upper Midwest Conference will gather later this month in Sioux City, Iowa, for our 2nd Annual Conference. This time together will offer us an opportunity to deepen our connections and put faces to names. As part of this, we'll be taking photos of those attending for our online database—helping us all know each other better.

Over the past year, we took a "snapshot" of our churches by submitting year-end statistics for the first time. These numbers give us a glimpse into each church's life at that moment. While they don't tell the full story, they offer valuable insight and, over time, will help us track the journey of our churches.

Here's a summary of the statistics we've gathered:

• Total Members: 20,985

Average Worship Attendance: 9,580
Average Online Attendance: 3,236

• Total Giving: \$22,486,233

• 2024 Baptisms: 430

• 2024 Professions of Faith: 479

These numbers are interesting because they reflect the makeup of our conference and offer a snapshot of our collective ministry. But behind every number is a story.

One story not yet captured in the statistics is of a young mom who was searching for God. She didn't grow up in church but felt drawn to know Him. One night, she woke up at 3:30 a.m. convinced that God was speaking to her. She looked online and found John 3:30: "He must become greater; I must become less." This verse led her to the church I serve, where she was baptized in May. She's now the newest member of our church family.

When next year's statistics include her story, it won't just be a number—it will represent a life where Jesus is becoming greater.

As we come to the Annual Conference, let's carry John 3:30 in our hearts. Let's come ready to become less, so that Jesus becomes more. Together, we can magnify and glorify His name—both as a conference and in each of our local churches.

I'm praying that God will bring us together for His great purposes and send us back into our communities to share the love and grace of Jesus Christ with everyone we meet.

Church Planting? Why Pray?

I am Jen Zoller, Grand View Methodist Church Children's and Member Care Pastor, 'church' planter, joined the prayer team not only because my district needed a representative but also because I was/am compelled to pray for those who have not yet heard the Good Shepherd's voice.

- 5) God empower all churches that would commit to fulfilling the Great Commission.



What is a Methodist?

One of the things that I have heard in these early days of the Global Methodist Church is that we need to reclaim aspects of Methodism that we have forgotten. Amen to that! However, I wonder if we are all on the same page about what it means to be a Methodist in the first place. Judging from nineteen years as a pastor, I don't know that the average person in the pew knows very much about Methodism and what makes it a powerful voice for the gospel in our world.

I am not trying to give anyone a hard time, to be clear. To whatever degree that is true, it is a sign of a failure in leadership over decades. If pastors haven't been explaining the value of Methodism, how can we expect most folks to know it? Further, if our pastors haven't been taught it in seminary (and we all know that some seminaries *didn't* teach it) or learned it in other ways, how can we expect them to teach it? It is a difficult set of circumstances, but one that deserves our attention.

There are many things we could say about Methodism, but John Wesley wrote a short pamphlet called "The Character of a Methodist" that is worth considering. Surely John Wesley's understanding of Methodism should count for something.

He starts out by being clear about what are *not* distinguishing marks of Methodism. He says that being a Methodist isn't in "any particular set of notions." It also isn't in any "peculiar mode of speaking." He says you cannot tell a Methodist because they do certain special things. He also says that Methodists aren't so obsessed with just one aspect of the faith that they never want to talk about anything else.

He then goes on to define what he means by Methodist. "A Methodist is one, who has the love of God shed abroad in his heart, by the Holy Spirit given unto him; one who loves the Lord his God with all his heart, and with all his soul, and with all his strength." Because of all of this, a Methodist is confident in God and is thankful for all that God has given. A Methodist prays, loves his neighbor, is pure in heart, and seeks to do the will of God. On top of that, a Methodist doesn't just say they do those things, they really do them and the world can see it because they are bearing fruit.

My favorite part of the pamphlet is after he lists all of these things and he imagines a response. Someone might say, "Why these are only the common, fundamental principles of Christianity." Wesley replies, essentially, "That is the point. All we really want to be are Christians."

If you are a little worried about all this talk about Wesley and Methodism, if you are nervous that this means that you need to accept some strange way of living so that we can reclaim our heritage, be at peace. To be a Methodist really means, at its core, to be a Christian and to seek to be one more and more. Now, it is true that the Wesleyan heritage emphasizes somethings that other Christians don't, but that is because Wesley wasn't satisfied with people just *knowing* the truth *about* God. He insisted that we must *live* the truth of God.

The world is often suspicious of denominations and large institutions. People may fear that our big goal is now to make a bunch of Methodists. The goal is not to make people loyal to Wesley, it is to make them loyal to Christ. If you can get on board with that, we can be of one mind. Everything we do has to be in service to that or else it is not true to Wesley's vision for Methodism. Let us follow Jesus together and make disciples of all nations!

2026 General Conference Delegate Nominees

The Nominations have been submitted, and the list of possible delegates for election to General Conference 2026 is below. We will be voting on the delegates on Saturday, June 14th at our Annual Conference.

We will also be taking Nominations from the floor at Annual Conference.

As a conference, the Upper Midwest needs 5 laity delegates, 5 clergy delegates, 1 lay alternate delegate, and 1 clergy alternate delegate. These delegates are required to attend the General Conference and participate in pre-conference meetings.

We are also encouraged to have reserve delegates who are willing to attend the conference, but are not required unless called upon to take the place of a delegate.

Laity Nominees Biographies

Jamal Boma: I was a team leader at production worker for 4 years. And active members of Mabaan Global Methodist church in Des Moines Iowa. The journey was easy being a Christ followed. There are ups and downs but I am determined to serve my God. That's what I chose. Daniel Evans: I am the leader of A Few Good Men and Women International. We are a nondenominational, spirit filled ministry of men and women who are obedient to God. Our focus is expanding God's Kingdom by preaching and teaching the gospel to the nations. Mark 16:15 and Matthew 28:19-20. We also support orphans, poor, homeless, and those in prison. Crusades, altar calls, and individual prayers result in many surrendering their minds, hearts, and souls to Jesus. I give all credit to Jesus, The Holy Spirit and our Father. There are many miracles, many are healed, demons cast out, and multiplication of food and Bibles for the new believers. Clergy Nominees Biographies

Luann Benge: My name is Luann Benge. I am a life-long Christian and follower of Jesus Christ. I have been married to my husband, Carl, for 24 years and we have two children, Sarah and Lydia. As an elder in the Global Methodist Church, I currently serve as the pastor at the Ida Grove Methodist Church in Ida Grove, Iowa. In my role as pastor, I am passionate about preaching, teaching, and discipleship. I thoroughly enjoy walking alongside the good folks at Ida Grove Methodist Church as we live out our calling to make disciples who will become disciple makers for Jesus Christ. I am also your current Vice Chairperson of the Board of Ministry, as well as your Conference Relations Chairperson. Additionally, I serve as the Presiding Elder for the Northwest Iowa District of the Upper Midwest Conference. I am honored to serve our conference in these roles because I get to walk alongside our brothers and sisters in this conference as well as in the Global Methodist Church as a whole. I would love to represent our conference as a delegate for the 2026 Global Methodist Church General Conference. As a leader in our conference, I am so excited about what I see God doing through and in the Global Methodist Church. I want to do all I can to help us continue to connect with our Wesleyan heritage as we move forward into who God has called us to be as Global Methodists.

<u>Rey Colon:</u> Born and raised in Puerto Rico but adopted via marriage by South Dakota. I have been a pastor for a number of years and have always felt called to be a leader. I believe that God has given me vision and communication skills to serve as a shepherd. I had the honor of serving as clergy delegate to the Convening Conference in 2024 in Costa Rica. This experience gave me hope for the denomination's future. It also provided me with a better understanding of what the GMC stands for and what it hopes to accomplish.

Darla Hadrick: My father was a pastor in the Methodist Church and so I was raised learning to love Jesus and everything about Jesus. Throughout my young life and into adult hood, my father taught me that Scripture is God's Divine Word and no man had any authority to change God's Word. I really did not fully understand what he meant until I grew older and saw how others would either remove, change, falsely interpret, or ignore the Word of God as written in Holy Scripture. Those acts broke my heart as I finally understood what my father was teaching me all along. We will only have a novel and not a solid foundation for which to stand upon for our salvation. We must follow the Word of God as written because that is what Jesus Christ did when he walked the earth. If selected as a delegate, it would be an honor to use Scripture to form our doctrines and disciplines so that the next generations will not have to experience shifting sand but rather a solid rock foundation. Currently I serve as a Presiding Elder in the SD West district. My leadership includes (former life); training new recruits in law enforcement, leading the reserve deputy unit and leading the shift of deputies. In ministry, I have started and lead Stephen Ministries, and various committees. By having a voice at the General Conference level, I would, in part, be stepping into the calling God has on my life. Also, by the time General Conference comes around again, it will be in 2032, and, God willing, I will be approaching Senior Status and it would be time for younger voices to lead us. But for now, I would hope for one more opportunity to serve God in the world, and in our denomination.

<u>Jeff Kelley:</u> Having served the church as an elder for 40 years and being a delegate to the past general conference in Costa Rica, I believe I bring a sense of wisdom and understanding of the church and its mission for the future. I would be humbled and honored to serve as a delegate once again.

Zach Kingery: I am 37 years old with a wife and three children, an ordained elder in the GMC, and currently reside in Clarinda Iowa. I grew up in a Wesleyan church in rural Kansas. Since 2009 I have served in youth ministry, pastoral ministry, and as a laity in adult discipleship in churches with numerically large and small congregations across the Midwest. I have been clergy in the UMC to GMC since 2016. I am committed to orthodox Wesleyan theology and desire to see lives transformed for the Gospel and nations reformed through the spread of Scriptural holiness. As a clergyperson called to rural and normative sized churches it is my hope to see the Methodist movement once again planting or revitalizing churches in all areas, empowering our congregations to advance the Kingdom of God. I lead the Upper Midwest Conference Multiplication team and am a Network Director with Dirt Roads Network which is a parachurch organization within the Wesleyan/Methodist tradition that works with clergy, congregations, and church plants. In both roles I place a vital importance on active discipleship and the development of spiritual leaders to see an Ephesians 4 APEST expression at the local level in order to see the Church multiply. As a delegate I will represent our rural congregations, be an advocate for Clergy who serve in normative sized churches across the US and the globe, and also place an important emphasis on active discipleship and multiplication practices that lead to healthy, fruitful congregations.

Jonathan Lee: Serving as a 2024 Global Methodist Church's General Conference delegate has been a profound honor. I feel called to continue offering my service out of a deep love for the Church and a strong commitment to its mission, unity, and global witness. As someone deeply engaged in multi-ethnic ministry, I am passionate about helping the Church reflect the beauty of Christ's international and diverse body. My leadership roles within the GMC reflect this commitment. I currently serve as Co-leader of the Multi-Ethnic Fellowship, President of the Korean Orthodox Pastors' Association (KOPA), Presiding Elder in the Minnesota area, and Chair of the Ethnic Ministry Team at the Upper Midwest Annual Conference. Michael McInnis: I served in ministry for 40 years across four denominations: the Free Methodist Church, United Methodist Church, Evangelical Covenant Church and now the Global Methodist Church. I graduated from Asbury Seminary and served churches in Nebraska, Kansas and Minnesota. Currently I'm part of the Jethro Project, mentor churches and pastors in the GMC in northwest Iowa. I have been involved in three church plants and two church building projects. The churches I served experienced numerical and financial growth. I served for eight years on the Nebraska Conference Board of Ordained ministry in the UMC and served with Walk to Emmaus ministry, including on the Nebraska board as state Spiritual Director for three years. He instructed his brothers on what to say to Pharaoh when he asked them and prepared Pharaoh with good words to communicate with them (Genesis 46:31, 34). Sometimes, those in Africa do not fully understand the GMC mission and vision. Why did we leave the UMC? After leaving the UMC, what is the GMC's goal? I can explain this to many of them in their languages and slang. I want to be elected to this General Conference as a delegate because I can communicate effectively, and those who have served with me in the UMC will be encouraged to serve and spread the word of God. Last week, we welcomed six new members to our church in Lake Park, and in Harris, we have three members who will attend church on Easter Sunday.

<u>Travis Stevick:</u> After growing up outside of the church, I became a Christian in high school and have been in pastoral ministry since I was twenty-one years old. I was ordained in the Iowa Conference of the United Methodist Church in 2013 and joined the Global Methodist Church in 2023 when my church disaffiliated. Because We Believe in the Power of Prayer:

A Call from the Assembly of Bishops

Dear Global Methodist Community,

Grace and peace to you from all of us who serve on the Assembly of Bishops.

We write today with hearts full—both in celebration and in sorrow. We celebrate the incredible harvest happening across the world as Methodist-minded people find a home in the Global Methodist Church. It is a joy to share that more than 5,000 member churches have joined the GMC, with new inquiries and affiliations arriving daily from every corner of the globe. At the same time, we carry a deep burden. Many in our connection are rejoicing, but others are suffering. As the Apostle Paul reminds us, "If one part suffers, every part suffers with it" (1 Corinthians 12:26). And so, we are calling our global connection to pray.

This is a time to intercede—especially for our brothers and sisters on the continent of Africa.

Many are aware of the violent clashes between Methodist factions in Nigeria. Fewer may know of the broader unrest sweeping across the continent. From Ethiopia to the Democratic Republic of Congo, from Mozambique and Nigeria to South Sudan, Sudan, Liberia, Zimbabwe, Niger, and Rwanda—conflict, political instability, demonstrations, terrorist activity, and civil wars persist. While many of these struggles are not directly related to denominational matters, we know that violence breeds violence. And as followers of Christ, we are called to grieve with all who grieve.

In moments like these, prayer can feel ineffective—but we believe it is our most powerful response. In prayer, we cry out to the One who "tore down the dividing wall of hostility" (Ephesians 2:14). We intercede because we hear Paul's warning to the Galatians: "If you bite and devour each other, watch out or you will be destroyed by each other" (Galatians 5:15). We heed Abner's ancient plea: "Must we always be fighting each other? Don't you realize that bitterness is the only result?" (2 Samuel 2:26).

Through prayer, we are aligning our hearts with the Lord's—hearts that beat for the poor, the marginalized, and the oppressed. And in prayer, we have been led to repentance, crying out for God to break our hearts for what breaks His.

We invite churches, annual conferences, and individual believers to find meaningful ways to pray—especially for Africa— We encourage you to search the Scriptures, follow global news, and pray as the Spirit leads. While we've highlighted regions experiencing active violence, we invite you to broaden your intercession across the continent and beyond.

In addition, we are working with the Prayer Network and the Global Methodist Church Communications Team to organize a **virtual Prayer Gathering**, providing a moment for our entire connection to gather online and pray as one body. We will share more details soon.

Thank you for joining us on this journey of prayer as we walk toward Pentecost.

Together, we believe the Spirit will move in powerful ways. And when we look back, we will be able to say with the saints: "Thus far, the Lord has helped us" (1 Samuel 7:12).
